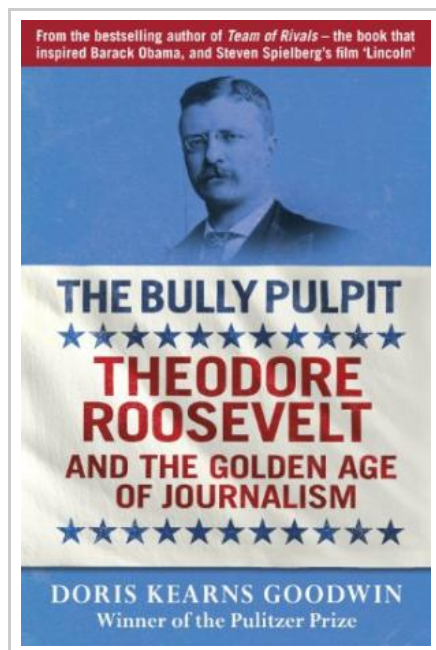




The Bully Pulpit: Theodore Roosevelt and the Golden Age of Journalism
