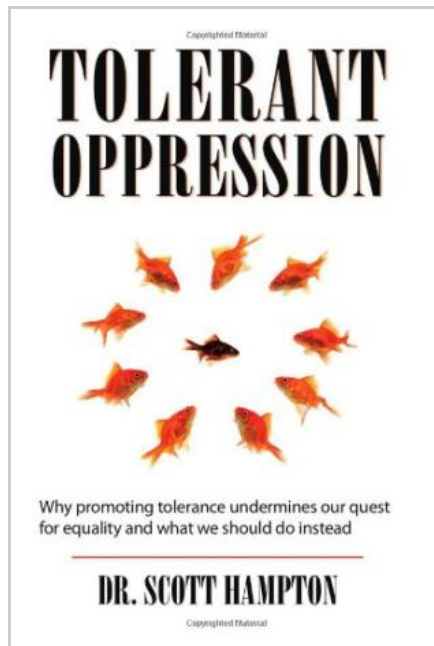




Tolerant Oppression: Why Promoting Tolerance Undermines Our Quest for Equality and What We Should Do Instead (Paperback)
